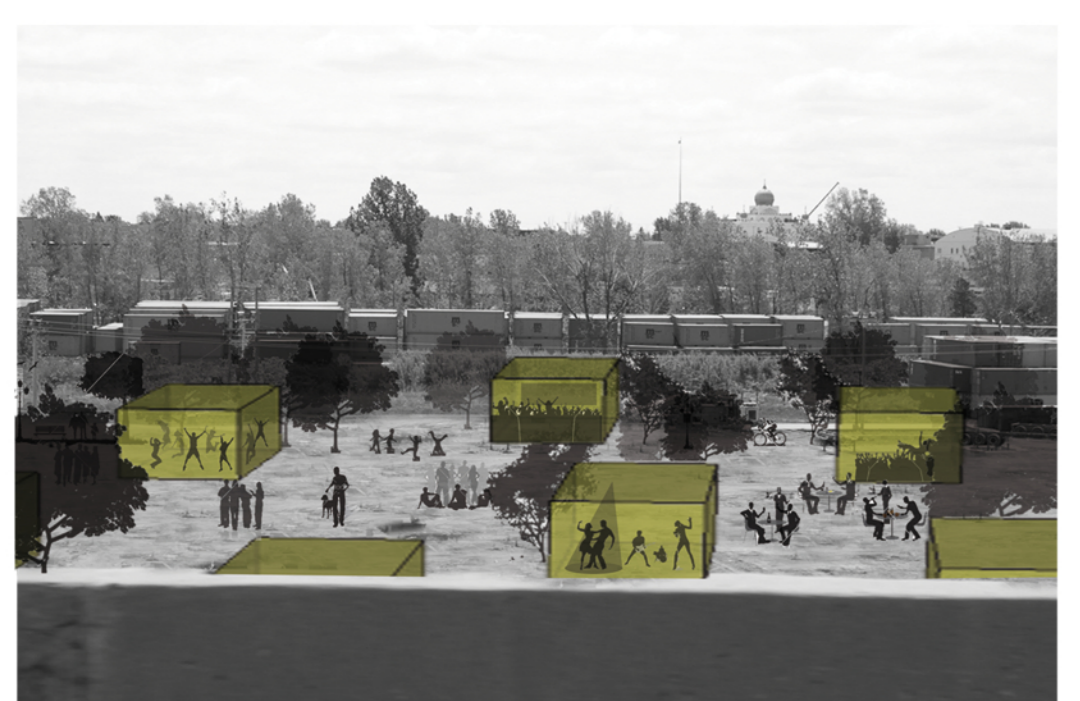

Augustin, Hebert and Adrienne DuVivier, the first colonists of Montreal

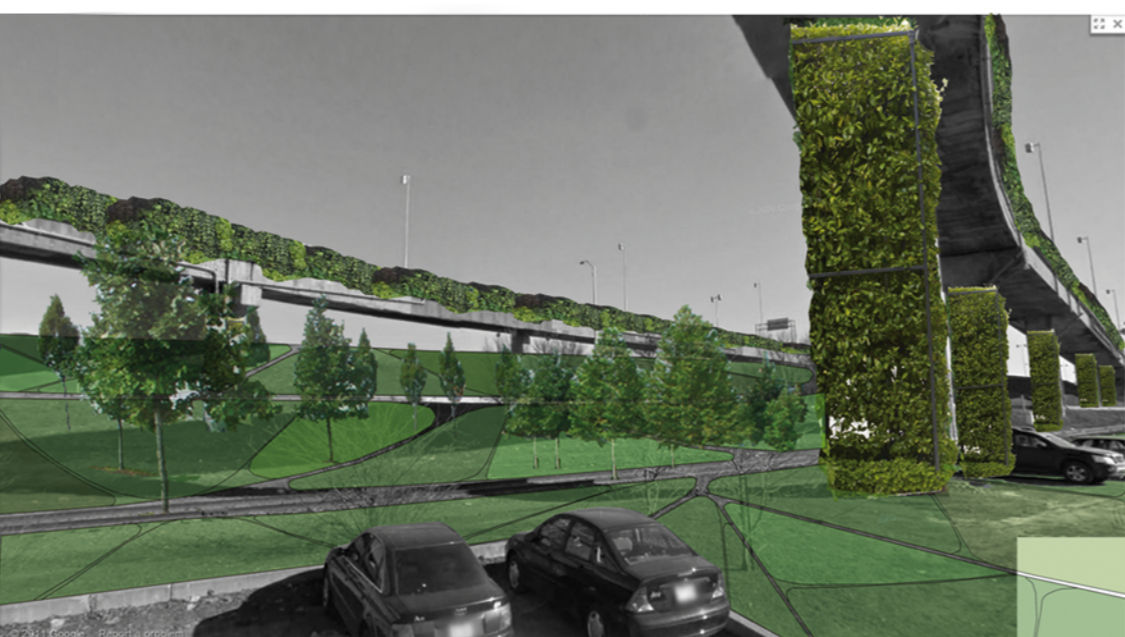
Hebert arrived in 1637.



Ever changing museum



Aside from being a city, Montreal is also an island located in the Saint Lawrence River. Approximately 50 kilometers long, 16 kilometers in width, with a 250 meter mountain occupying its center, it was originally inhabited by the Algonquians. The name of the island changed over the years. The island was called *Tchicouche* by the Huron-Wendat in the Iroquois language.



Paul de Chomedey de Montmorency was born in France in 1600. He was a military leader and a nobleman who came to Montreal to found a colony concentrated to the Holy Virgin in New France, and to call it Ville-Marie.



Botanical garden

Over the 20th century, the botanical garden was transformed into a series of different spaces of the island. It integrates from many different parts of the world the most beautiful plants.

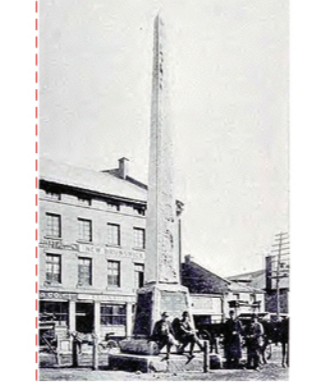


In order to reduce city traffic, improve safety and create a more vibrant city, the government of Quebec (under the control of the Parti Quebecois) passed legislation in 2007 to change a number of cities and municipalities into a single city. The new city of Montreal was created by merging 35 municipalities and merged with the city of Montreal.

Night and Day museum

In 1535, Jacques Cartier (an explorer from France) was amongst the first Europeans to set foot on the island. He and his men climbed up the mountain of France. Cartier named the mountain "le mont-Royal".

In the early 1600's, the island was colonized by the French and the city of Montreal (originally called Ville-Marie) was founded by Paul de Chomedey de Montmorency. The name "Montreal" was derived from the French name Mont Royal.

Hockey rink for winter sports



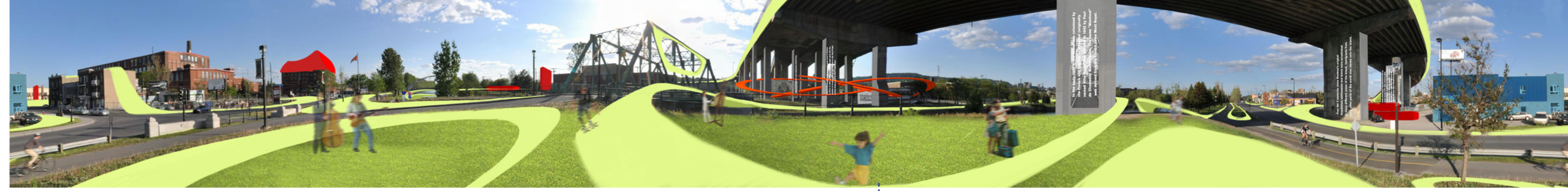
After the failure of the first colony by the British, the British and the French fought the Battle of the Plains of Abraham in 1760. Montreal was later occupied and administered by Great Britain. The British did not expel the French from the island. The island was later named in honor of the subject of the British empire.

Industrial heritage



As of 2021, the island was home to 27 towers plus the city hall. The city population stood at 1.6 million and the entire island at 2.3 million (Source: UN Population Division 2006 estimates)
